THE RABBI'S COLUMN: GETTING TO KNOW YOU

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PLEASANTVILLE

So much good is already coming out of last month's Interfaith Thanksgiving Service at PCS. A group of religious studies majors is set to meet with the Pleasantville Clergy Association this month, to learn about our interfaith work. A group of Buddhists are coming to our synagoque's Shabbat Morning Meditation on December 18. And as I was writing this column, Michael Gold, head of our Social Action Committee, informed me that he has been able to arrange an evening with the local Muslim community at PCS on Saturday night, December 11 at the synagogue. Details were still being worked out, but he told me that the idea is just to get the two communities together to break bread and to get to know each other socially.

"There's no agenda here other than bringing together two communities that otherwise might not have an opportunity to meet and mingle," Michael said. "There's so much polarization, fear, and anger. We have to do better, and this is a step; a small step, but a step. We'll have food; we may have some light entertainment, all of that is still being worked out. But I've already gotten a nice response from people who have

heard about this event informally. There'll be no lecture, no speeches; there's no purpose here other than to provide an evening where people can talk."

Everyone is welcome! Indeed, if you asked any of our teens who have taken our Hebrew High School Comparative Religion course at PCS over the past few years, they would likely tell you that one of the highlights of that course was meeting my friend Dr. Mahjabeen Hassan and a group of local Muslim teens.

In the meantime, I wish you all a very Happy Channukah (first night is Wednesday, December 1, and Rabbi Pamela Wax and I will be conducting a Healing Service together to which you and your friends and neighbors are also all welcome). May it be a season of increasing light for us all!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

These days I am feeling discouraged by the political climate in our country; I cannot remember a time when the possibility for change and progress seemed less likely. Even more, I cannot remember a time when politicians on both sides of the spectrum seemed less inclined to work effectively and harmoniously with one another for our common good. We seem to be preparing ourselves for utter gridlock, just when action is called for. Why?

I don't have any easy answers, and few of us would believe someone who said there were any. What I look for, what I like to explore, are ancient parallels to the situation in which we find ourselves mired. Here's one that we read about recently in Shabbat services—the story of Jacob and

Esau. After cheating his brother Esau out of both his birthright and his father's blessing, Jacob fearfully meets Esau and says he sees the "face of God" in him. Instead of holding on to his fear, instead of building a case against him for being different, his eyes are opened to the beauty in Esau. He recognizes his neshama. This is an aspect of the holiness of Jacob, the ability to step out of his habitual pattern. While we may not be able to see with Jacob's eyes, we too can challenge our habits and see our humanity and of our common heritage in the other. We do follow different pathways; we do have different hopes and dreams; we do disagree. Do we then have to become disagreeable?

Our leaders in Congress have a different agenda: it is to pur-

sue power and to retain it. In many cases it is to follow slavishly an ideology that makes the world understandable to them. Ideologies are dangerous; they get in the way of our seeing the face of the other, let alone God in that face. Back in the sixties there was a popular bumper sticker that said:"If the people lead, the leaders will follow." One function I see our community taking on is just this—to lead, to create new models of leadership. It is my wish that we not only continue to do this, but to reach out to others, both within and outside of our community, to do the same.

Ask The Rabbi

Last month Rabbi Mark met with our first grade class for a session of Ask the Rabbi (on November 9). The children all had such wonderful questions. Here's a little bit of the exchange that day between Rabbi Mark and the children

Jack Klinger: Why do we light candles on Shabbat?

Rabbi Mark: Shabbat candles? It's like a birthday cake for God! Every week on Friday night (and Saturday) we celebrate that the Universe is another week older! Light reminds us of how God created the universe ("God said: Let there be light!"). So I hope that every time your family lights Shabbat candles you think of all the joy and all of the good things that God created in the world.

Max Cohen: How did people write with feathers?

Rabbi Mark: You're right, Max. In the old days - before people invented pens, pencils, markers, or even crayons - people wrote with feathers! Some smart person realized that the end of a feather quill is sharp, and that if we dip it in ink we can write letters. And guess what? When the person who writes a Torah scroll does that today, he or she still writes the Torah with a feather, just like in the old days!

Miranda Miller: How long would it take to read the Torah?

Rabbi Mark: Well, a grownup could start reading it early in the morning, and finish it the same day. But we take a whole year to read it in synagogue, just a little bit each week. Why? Because we love to ask questions about the Torah and to talk about what we think it means to us. So we take our time and read it slowly!

Taylor Primack: How long ago did the dinosaurs live?

Rabbi Mark: The dinosaurs lived until about 65 million years ago. That's a very long time ago! But did you know that there are still some dinosaurs on earth? Really! They're called...birds. That's right, the birds are descended from dinosaurs. Amazing!

Jake Tetenman: How long did the ten plagues last?

Rabbi Mark: Well, after the first plague a week passed before the second plague. But the Torah doesn't tell us how many days were between all the other plagues, so we don't know how long the plagues lasted altogether. Maybe a month? [The ninth plague, darkness, lasted for three days There was a break of ten days between the ninth and tenth plagues. So altogether a month – perhaps 40 days – is suggested.]

Jake And how long ago was that?

Rabbi Mark: Much more than 3,000 years ago!

Jake: And did only the bad people have to go through the plagues, or the good people too?

Rabbi Mark: Great question. Some, like darkness, affected everybody. But some only punished the bad people. It's like that today. Sometimes only bad people are punished for what they do wrong. But sometimes – like when we don't take care of the environment, when we make the air or water dirty – it hurts everybody. That's why we all need to take care of the earth together!
