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The Rabbi's Column: Awesome

In the Torah, there's a story about Jacob who falls asleep in a holy place (he didn't realize it was a holy place or presumably he'd not fall asleep there). He has a dream. In his dream angels are going down and up on a ladder (that's when he realizes he's fallen asleep in a holy place). And when he wakes up, he rubs his eyes and says "Ma nora ha makom ha zeh," which in Biblical Hebrew translates as, "How awesome is this place!"

But when modern Hebrew speakers read the story today they really don't know what to make of it, because in modern Hebrew "nora" no longer means "awesome" but rather it means "awful."

The deep connection between the two words is instructive. On the one hand, awesome and awful seem to have nothing in common; seem, of course, to be opposites of each other. On the other hand, they have more in common than we know. We call something awesome for the same reason that we call something awful: because it has the capacity to arrest our attention.

An unfortunate truth about the times in which we live is that while awful events retain their capacity to capti-

vate our attention, the awesome ones – sunrises, sunsets, the daily miracles of life – seem in danger of slipping from consciousness. We're overwhelmed, and our capacity for joy is compromised.

But Rosh Hashanna arrives with its annual promise. Not that the coming year will be free of all sadness and difficulty (as much as we pray that it will not be overwhelmingly so); but that the coming year will be a year in which our attention will somehow be drawn again and our hearts be open as well again to the awesome.

Rosh Hashanna is our time for reflecting, reprioritizing, and re-orienting ourselves. What in the world, in our society, and in our own lives is in need of repair, and how might we set about doing that work? What is not going to likely or ever change, and where will we find the strength – and offsetting moments of joy and equanimity – to retain our hope and deep appreciation for the blessings we have been given? May the holiday season afford us all new opportunities, in spite of the awful, to once again be open, deeply and appreciatively so, to the awesome.

president's message

I am writing this prior to leaving on vacation in Europe. This year Eve-Marie and I and 2 of our children and our future daughter-in-law are making a heritage trip to the birthplaces of some of our grandparents and my mother. We will be visiting Lithuania, Poland and Germany, going to the villages where they were born and also taking in the major cities nearby—Vilnius, Warsaw, Krakow and Berlin—hoping to find the remnants of Jewish history that have survived there. This is a trip I have dreamed of taking for many years and I'm thrilled that I'm finally doing it, and doing it at a leisurely pace. I've read up on some of the history

of the Jewish people in these countries, but nothing can replace seeing them for myself. I know that only Berlin has a substantial Jewish population these days, around 50,000-- almost all recent émigrés from Russia—but I know the sense of history, of lives lived and lost, still resound through the streets and countryside. And as I say, it promises to be even more meaningful because we are bringing 2 sons along. I remember in the past how much more I understood and felt when I brought my children to different places and could experience their questions and observations along with my own.

As Jews we live and celebrate the cycles of time; it infuses the essence of our faith as we remember our past and look forward to our future. This is exactly what I feel compelled to experience, and not just experience but to share with my family. There is continuity; we carry our heritage in our bodies and in our spirit; I want all my children to know this. As we walk the streets and as we breathe the air we will know more who these forebearers were and how we carry them in us. I will write more about this in a future message.

Our annual candlelight service, in which our children participate, will once again be held on Yom Kippur, Saturday, September 18th at the conclusion of services. Children should assemble at approximately 7:00pm



CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Helen Harrison and Sara Tauber will lead our children's programming this year. The children will be divided into 2 groups with Helen Harrison leading activities for Kindergarten thru 3rd grades, and Sara Tauber leading the 4, 5, and 6th grades. Each group will participate in a program of about one hour from 11:30-12:30 on both days of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur.

We encourage families to hear the blowing of the shofar and Ashrei in the sanctuary before the sermon, which begins at approximately 11:30 am. The shofar will also be blown in the classes.

BABYSITTING

Babysitting will be provided during all the services that are held at the Rosenthal JCC, but will be limited to pre-k through 2nd grade. All children must be signed in and out. Children will not be allowed to leave the babysitting room without being signed out by a parent. Thus, it is important that you check on them periodically.

Children in the 3rd through 6th grade who need a break from services can go to the atrium during the times when there is no children's programming. Otherwise, they can go to the room adjoining the babysitting room. While there will be an attendant on duty to maintain order, there will not be babysitting for the older children, nor will there be a sign-in procedure. No one will be permitted in empty classrooms, hallways or the JCC lobby. Please remind your children of these rules and of your expectations of appropriate behavior. If children are not in the babysitting room, they are their parent's responsibility.

We are continuing to make improvements to the children's program that we hope will enhance your family's experience of the high holidays. We welcome your input and participation.

POETRY CORNER

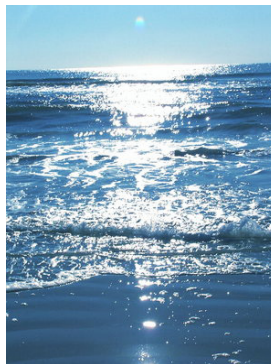
FOR THE GULF

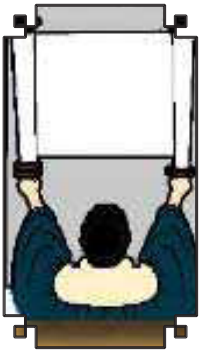

My parents raised me and my three siblings in an ardently Zionist home. We were fortunate enough to make fairly frequent trips to Israel touring the country, visiting family on kibbutzim and trying to keep up with our mother who would follow any tour guide anywhere despite security warnings and the lack of confidence we all felt in the tour guide's ability to actually use the weapon he had casually thrown into the back of his sedan, if G-d forbid, he actually had to use it. A teen tour to Israel at 16 on a Rabbi led NFTY tour deep in the Sinai desert, poised to ascend Mt. Sinai, is the place I identify as the beginning of a Jewish spiritual awakening. A profound moment that was the culmination of a Jewish self awareness and a connection I felt to something greater. I knew I would ultimately share my life with someone that felt similarly, and fortunately, met Dave at that great Jewish mecca, the State University of New York at Albany.

Raising our children in a vibrant Jewish community was paramount to Dave and me. After more than a decade of membership at a local conservative shul in Briarcliff, Dave and I felt very little connection to our spiritual Judaism. A family friend suggested we visit PCS and after attending our first Friday night service, it was love at first sight - for all of us. The children, in particular, would distinguish PCS from other synagogues by describing it as the "happy shul". From Rabbi Mark's inspirational service filled with music and discussion to the welcoming warmth of the highly devoted community members - we knew something special was happening at this shul in Pleasantville and wanted to be a part of it.

Inspired by Rabbi Mark's Shabbat services and engaging weekly sermons, I took steps towards learning more about Judaism in general. I first took Rabbi Mark's highly informative Introduction to Judaism 101 class, then Phil Paris's trope class to learn how to chant Torah, becoming part of the Torah reader's circle chanting Torah on Saturday mornings once a month for about three years. Two years ago for about two years, I studied monthly with Rabbi Paley at a UJA sponsored course.

It's been a pleasure to be the Bnei Mitzvah community service project coordinator working with our Bnei Mitzvah kids and their families find community service activities that are meaningful to them and I'm happy to help Michal, our Hebrew School principal, by being a class parent in our children's classes.

I am truly humbled to accept the honor of this year's Chattan Torah. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to share my story with you and thank you to the community to which I am eternally grateful for being such a warm, welcoming, vibrant congregation that has opened the door to my Jewish heart.

Note from Diana Benattar (Our Kallat Bereshit)

I am truly honored that PCS has chosen me to be the Kallat Bereshit this year. Sharing this honor with Emma is very special, as without her encouragement learning to read Torah would never have been as fun.

I grew up in an observant Conservative home in Westchester. My father was a Cantor and attending services was an integral part of my childhood memories. As a young child I remember looking up with pride and awe as my dad chanted the prayers, leading the entire congregation in song. Soon I joined in and sang with the temple children's choir, and eventually with the adult choir during the High Holy Days. I became a Bat Mitzvah at age 12, chanted the Haftarah and led the Shabbat services. I didn't quite understand why I wasn't allowed to read from the Torah like my brother.

My parents were both passionate Zionists, and instilled in all three of their children a strong love for Israel. I began at an early age to imagine myself living in Israel. Making Aliyah became my focus in my teenage years. During the summers of my college years I worked in Israel, first as an au pair and then on a kibbutz where I met a new immigrant from France, David, who became my husband and road mate. I learned to speak Hebrew, relishing in recognizing words from the prayers I chanted in my father's temple. I made aliyah after I finished college, and my brother and sister followed soon after.

Looking back over the years I lived in Israel, I feel immense pride in what I achieved. I studied in a new immigrant retraining program at Bar Ilan University, received my degree in Social Work and began working as a community social worker. Working in the "schunot mitzukah", low income neighborhoods of Tel Aviv and Jerusalem, I became passionate about Tikkun Olam. I was faced almost right away with the inequities of the Israeli society of the late 1970's, and felt drawn to help organize the residents to make their voices heard by the establishment. Working hand in hand with the community activists, it became evident to me that many Jews from Arab countries were at a socioeconomic disadvantage, through no fault of their own. These experiences will be forever etched in my mind as one of the most gratifying periods of my life.

Upon return to the States, David and I felt secure in our Jewish identity. Our most important task was to provide our children with a rich Jewish cultural environment but living up in Brewster we found this difficult. We speak Hebrew at home, celebrated Shabbat every week as a family, and our children found a home in Habonim Dror (a youth Zionist movement) summer camps. I was happy we could provide these experiences for our children, but still felt that I had not found my own Jewish spiritual home. Over the years, we were members at several area synagogues, but never found the perfect fit.

Six years ago we moved to Pleasantville, and while unpacking I unearthed the 2003 NY Times article about PCS. We visited, and were immediately drawn in by the music and warmth that filled the sanctuary. A few years later, I was struck by the Rabbi's High Holy Day sermon about finding and exploring one aspect of Judaism over the coming year as a way to reconnect. I decided that my exploration would be to finally learn how to chant from the Torah.

I was fortunate to have the opportunity to learn in a "chavurah" atmosphere, and under the patient guidance of Phil Paris. It was in this class that I met my "Torah Buddy", Emma. We've been good friends ever since, and continue to practice our Torah portions together, often at Jean Jacques over cups of tea. Several years ago, I was asked to be PCS's first female gabbait, an enormous honor. Now, every time I step up to the bimah, I feel both the memory of my father's legacy, and the continuation of my own Jewish journey.

I truly feel that PCS has become my spiritual home, a place where I feel welcomed and fulfilled. I always leave services feeling a bit more connected and grounded. I am very grateful to this warm congregation who welcomed me with open arms. Thank you for the opportunity to share my story with you.
